## Federal Fiscal Year 2020 Grants Summary

- The State of California was awarded over **\$123 billion** in federal grant funding for the 2019-2020 federal fiscal year, \$36 billion (42%) more than the previous year.
- California received over **12%** of all federal grant funding awarded both domestically and internationally.
- Supplemental federal grant funding to California in response to **COVID-19** totaled \$16 billion.
- Federal grant funding per capita in California was **\$3,125**, greater than the national average of **\$2,842**.
- Schools in California received **\$4.6 billion** in federal funding<sup>1</sup>.
- Local governments in the state (counties, cities, and special districts) received over **\$19 billion**<sup>2</sup>.
- The State government reported federal expenditures of **\$143.4 billion** in FY20,<sup>3</sup> including over **\$50 billion** in non-budgetary benefits funding unreported in the \$123 billion figure.
- State agencies and departments<sup>4</sup> applied for 601 federal grants and were awarded 549.
- OPR facilitated training in federal grant management to over 300 individuals.

## Introduction to Federal Grants

Federal grants are one of the most significant ways that the United States government supports the health and welfare of people across the world. The largest use of federal grant funds is for the Medical Assistance Program for medical payments through Medicare and Medicaid, followed by transportation, education, housing assistance, agricultural support, food and nutrition, utilities, emergency management and disaster relief, the environmental, museums and libraries, arts and humanities, and children and family services. Federal grants also pay for medical research through the NIH, aeronautics research through NASA, energy research through the Department of Energy, law enforcement initiatives through the Department of Justice, diplomatic initiatives through the Department of State, foreign aid through the USAID, and many other efforts.

Federal grants are just one type of the financial assistance provided by the federal government, along with direct payments, contracts, loans, insurance, and other forms of aid. In Federal Fiscal Year 2020 (FFY20), the federal government obligated spending of \$9.1 trillion, \$2.5 trillion more than was obligated in FFY19. The \$971 billion in federal grants represents approximately 10% of all federal spending in FFY20. Fixed charges totaled \$5.8 trillion in FFY20 and include Social Security benefits, business loan guarantee subsidy, interest on the public debt, the U.S. Coronavirus payments, and many other subsidies, contributions, indemnities, and other payments.

The process of federal grant funding begins with *appropriations* bills passed by Congress followed by allocations made by the Department of the Treasury to specific agency spending accounts. Federal agencies then *obligate* those funds through grant awards. The grant funding amounts used in this report reflect those obligations. Last, federal agencies authorize payments, called *outlays*, to indicate grant award funds have been paid to the recipient.

Federal grants are awarded by dozens of federal agencies and include block grants, formula grants, project grants (or competitive), and cooperative agreements (or pass-through). Other types of government funding like direct payments (like Social Security or housing vouchers), loans, insurance, or procurement contracts are not included in the definition of federal grants. All federal grants can be identified by their Catalog of Federal Domestic Assistance (CFDA) number, a five digit number for every federal assistance program of which the first two digits identify the federal agency issuing the award.

## OPR Federal Grant Resources

Assembly Bill 1348 (Irwin, Chapter 444, Statutes of 2016)<sup>5</sup>, authorized the State Clearinghouse, located within the Governor’s Office of Planning and Research (OPR), to establish a Federal Grant Administrator to serve as a primary point of contact for information on federal grants related to community, economic, and local development.

This summary of federal grant funding identifies and analyzes performance metrics for the funding year as outlined in the statute:

“On or before January 1, 2018, and annually thereafter, the Federal Grant Administrator shall prepare a summary of federal grant funding to the state that includes, but is not limited to, all of the following performance metrics:

(1) Number of federal grants awarded to the state during the three years prior to the establishment of the Federal Grant Administrator and during the report year.

- (2) Number of completed federal grant applications submitted by the state during the report year.
- (3) Total federal dollars received by the state through federal grants during the report year.
- (4) Total federal grant dollars expended by the state during the report year.
- (5) Total federal grant dollars received in the state by school districts and local governments during the report year.
- (6) Number of training sessions hosted by the Federal Grant Administrator and attendance at those events during the report year.
- (7) Other relevant information regarding federal grant activities within the state during the report year, as determined by the federal grant administrator.”<sup>6</sup>

The “report year” for this 2021 report is Federal Fiscal Year 2020 (FFY20), which represents the time period of October 1, 2019 to September 30, 2020. Some financial data in this report provided by State sources uses the State Fiscal Year 2020 (FY20) of July 1, 2019 to June 30, 2020. Sources for this report included a network of statewide agency partners, the California Department of Finance, the California State Controller’s Office, USASpending.gov, Grants.gov, SAM.gov, the US Census Bureau, the Federal Audit Clearinghouse, Federal Funds Information for States, federal grant-making agencies, and other sources of information to collect and analyze the data reflected in this report. Data reported by USASpending.gov is updated regularly and may not reflect current figures. Throughout this report, the terms grants, funds, funding, assistance, and awards may be used interchangeably. Revenues refers to funds received (or obligated), and expenditures refers to funds spent by the recipient.

The State Clearinghouse serves as the state's Single Point of Contact for the review of federal assistance applications pursuant to Presidential Executive Order No. 12372. Notification of all federal assistance applications must be provided to the SCH pursuant to Assembly Bill No. 1348, which in turn publishes this information for review and comment by State and local elected officials. SAM Section 0912 requires that departments submit new federal funds through the SCH and then through Finance through a Standard Form 424 notification prior to applying for funds.

The OPR website contains a [page for Intergovernmental Review of Federal Programs](#) where all applicants to federal grant programs shall provide notification prior to applying for funds.

## Federal Grant Funding


Federal Fiscal Year 2020 saw a significant increase in federal grants spending in response to the COVID-19 pandemic. The federal government awarded \$971 billion in grants in the Federal Fiscal Year 2020 (FFY20) worldwide, over \$206 billion more than the \$765 billion awarded in FFY19, an increase of 27%. FFY20 covers the time period of October 1, 2019 to September 30, 2020 and includes the Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security (CARES) Act and other supplementary relief funding in response to the pandemic.<sup>7</sup>

Figure 1: Total Federal Grant Obligations, FFY16 to FFY20



The vast majority of federal grants are awarded within the United States, but over \$18 billion in federal grants were awarded in FFY20 to places outside the United States through the United States Agency for International Development (USAID), the Department of State (DOS), and other federal agencies, compared to \$15 billion in FFY19. California was awarded over **\$123 billion** in federal grants in FFY20 though over 40,000 individual grant awards to state and local governments, tribes, nonprofits, and many other types of grantees. The total amount of federal grant funding awarded to California overall in FFY20 was about 42% greater than the \$87 billion awarded in FFY19, largely due to increased federal funding in response to the COVID-19 pandemic. California received an average of about **\$3,125** in federal grants per capita in FFY20, greater than the national average<sup>8</sup> of \$2,842 and California’s FFY19 per capita of \$2,207.

Figure 2: Total Grant Obligations to CA, FFY16 to FFY20





California received over **\$123 billion** in federal grant funding in FFY20. This number represents the amount of grant funding “obligated,” or awarded, by federal agencies to entities within the state in FFY20. Awardees include state government as well as schools and universities, tribes, cities, counties, special districts, nonprofits, businesses, and other entities. Funding totals are subject to change over time due to award amendments, and many grants support multi-year initiatives where funding awarded in one year is obligated over multiple years.

Nearly every state and territory<sup>9</sup> received more federal grant funding in FFY20 compared to FFY19. California’s grant funding awarded (obligated) in FFY20 was over \$36 billion more than the total of \$87 billion in FFY19, an increase of 42%. Of the fifty states, California was second only to North Dakota in terms in the percentage increase in federal funding between FFY19 and FFY20. Approximately \$16 billion of federal grant funding to California in FFY20 was directly attributable to COVID-19 spending authorized by the CARES Act and other Coronavirus legislation.

The State of California paid approximately \$467 billion in gross collections to the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) in FFY20, which includes the total collected from business, individual, estate, trust, and other taxes. The \$123 billion received in federal grant obligations represents 26% of the total paid by the State of California, slightly less than the U.S. average of 28%. The amount of federal grant funding awarded as a percentage of total IRS collections varies widely among the fifty states, the District of Columbia, U.S. territories and associated states, and foreign countries.

COVID-19 funding allocated approximately \$16 billion in grants to California as authorized by the Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security (CARES) Act and its predecessors the Coronavirus Preparedness and Response Supplemental Appropriations Act, the Families First Coronavirus Response Act, and the Paycheck Protection Program and Health Care Enhancement Act. This funding is identified by a Disaster Emergency Fund Code (DEFC) used to track the spending of supplemental funding for disasters and emergencies such as COVID-19. Each code corresponds to one or more legislative bills that authorized the funding. The Department of Transportation (DOT) awarded the most COVID-19 funding to California at \$4.9 billion, much of which (\$3.6 billion) was awarded by the Federal Transit Administration (FTA).

## Health and Human Services (HHS)

\$85,184,781,517

The Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) awarded over \$85 billion in grant funding to California in FFY20 through 13 sub-agencies. HHS funding increased \$21.8 billion (34%) from the previous fiscal year, primarily due to the increase in funding for the subagency Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) which increased \$19 billion from \$47 billion in FFY19 to \$66 billion in FFY20. Approximately \$4.5 billion in HHS funding to CA was supplemental COVID-19 funding that funded over 70 grant programs.

Over two-thirds of HHS funding to California (over \$66 billion) was awarded to the California Department of Health Care Services, which administers the \$63 billion Medical Assistance Program (CFDA 93.778). HHS funding was also awarded to other state agencies, universities, research institutes, nonprofits, county and local governments and other entities. HHS grant programs also include Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) (CFDA 93.558), the Children’s Health Insurance Program (CHIP) (CFDA 93.767), and Head Start (CFDA 93.600).

HHS grant funding also supports foster care, child care, adoption assistance, and many other programs through the Administration for Children and Families (ACF) subagency of HHS. Subagency the National Institutes of Health (NIH) funded billions of dollars in health and medical research in California at institutes of higher education, hospitals, nonprofits, business enterprises, and other entities. Health Resources and Services Administration (HRSA) grants supported the expansion and improvement of health centers and other health care services. Grants from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) supported Epidemiology and Laboratory Capacity for Infectious Diseases (CFDA 93.323) and other public health programs. Eight additional HHS subagencies funded grants to support programs on substance abuse, behavioral and mental health, aging, hospital preparedness, food and drug research, public health for tribal populations, and other areas.

## Department of Transportation (DOT)

\$12,973,649,043

The Department of Transportation (DOT) awarded nearly \$13 billion in grants to California in FFY20 through nine sub-agencies, about \$6.8 billion more than the previous fiscal year. Approximately \$4.9 billion of DOT funding to California was in COVID-19 supplemental funding, which funded \$3.6 billion in Federal Transit Formula Grants (CFDA 20.507), \$1.3 billion in Airport Improvement Program (CFDA 20.106), and \$30 million in Formula Grants for Rural Areas and Tribal Transit Program (CFDA 20.509).

Unlike previous fiscal years, more DOT funding was dedicated to transit than highways in California, although the reverse was true nationwide. Over \$7 billion was awarded by the Federal Transit Administration (FTA) to California, most of which (nearly \$5 billion) was awarded in Federal Transit Formula Grants (CFDA 20.507) to nearly 100 transit agencies and local governments across the state. The Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) awarded over \$4 billion to California, most of which was awarded to the California Department of Transportation primarily for Highway Planning and Construction (CFDA 20.205). In addition to transit and highways, DOT funding was awarded for rail and airport improvements, senior and disability programs, safety programs, trails, pipeline safety, and other mobility and infrastructure programs.

## Department of Education (ED)

\$9,349,892,902

The Department of Education (ED) awarded \$9.3 billion in grants to California in FFY20, \$3.9 billion more than the previous year and \$3.8 billion of which was COVID-19 funding.

Over two-thirds of ED funding to the state (\$6.5 billion) was awarded to the California Department of Education, which in turn funded local educational agencies and other recipients through sub-awards. ED funding was also awarded to other state agencies, institutes of higher education, school districts, nonprofit organizations, and other entities. The largest ED grant program in FFY20 was the Education Stabilization Fund (CFDA 84.425), which awarded \$3.8 billion in California to prevent, prepare for, and

respond to the coronavirus COVID-19 disease pandemic. The second largest ED grant program was the over \$2 billion Title I Grants to Local Educational Agencies. ED funding was also allocated to special education, rehabilitation services, instruction support, and other educational programming for youth and adults. ED awards federal grants through its offices, as detailed below.

USDA awarded over \$5.3 billion in grants to California in FFY20, over \$635 million (13%) more than the previous fiscal year’s total of \$4.7 billion. Approximately \$748 million of USDA funding in FFY20 was supplemental COVID-19 funding.

Most of the USDA funding to California at over \$5 billion (94%) was awarded by the Food and Nutrition Service (FNS) for programs including the National School Lunch Program, the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP), and the Women, Infants, and Children (WIC) nutrition program. The largest recipients of USDA funding in California were the State’s Departments of Education, Social Services, Public Health, and Food and Agriculture. Funding was also awarded to universities, special districts, cities and counties, nonprofits, tribes, businesses, and other entities.

## Department of Homeland Security (DHS)

\$2,858,936,548

The Department of Homeland Security awarded over \$2.8 billion in grant funding to California in FFY20, more than three times the previous fiscal year's sum of \$940 million. COVID-19 funding accounted for approximately \$840 million.

Nearly all DHS funding (99%) was through the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA), with \$2.3 billion dedicated to Disaster Grants Public Assistance for Presidentially Declared Disasters (CFDA 97.036). The Governor's Office of Emergency Services was awarded \$2.7 billion, the majority of which was distributed through subawards to local governments. Other DHS grant funding supported Homeland Security, Hazard Mitigation, Fire Management Assistance, Fire and Emergency Response, Emergency Management, Port Security, Rail and Transit Security, and many other public safety and disaster response programs.

## Housing and Urban Development (HUD)

\$1,908,589,072

HUD awarded over \$1.9 billion in grants to California in FFY20 through six subagencies. HUD funding to the state increased \$354 million (23%) from the FFY19 total of \$1.5 billion. COVID-19 funding accounted for \$367 million of the FFY20 HUD funding to California.

The subagency for Community Planning and Development, which awarded nearly \$1.5 billion, includes the Community Development Block Grants (CDBG) (CFDA 14. 218), homelessness and housing assistance programs, and other community development funding and technical assistance. The California Department of Housing and Community Development (HCD) was the largest recipient of HUD funding at approximately \$460 million, followed by the cities and counties of Los Angeles, San Francisco, and Sacramento.

**Department of Labor (DOL)**

\$1,400,653,143

The Department of Labor (DOL) awarded over \$1.4 billion in grants to California in FFY20, \$366 million (35%) more than in FFY19. Approximately \$388 million of DOL funding to the state in FFY20 was in response to COVID-19.

Nearly all of DOL funding (\$1.3 billion) was awarded by the Employment and Training Administration (ETA) for unemployment insurance, Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act (WIOA) programs, and other employment services and training grants. The California Employment Development Department (EDD) was the largest recipient of DOL funding in the state with nearly \$1.3 billion. Other DOL awardees include additional state agencies, nonprofits, institutes of higher education, local governments, and other entities.

The National Science Foundation awarded \$979 million in grants to California in FFY20, a 7% increase from the FFY19 total of \$913 million. Over \$10 million of this funding was in response to COVID-19.

NSF funding was issued through its offices and directorates, which include studies in mathematical and physical sciences, education and human resources, computer and information sciences, engineering, geosciences, biological sciences, and other fields of study. Grants were primarily awarded to institutions of higher education, with other awards made to science and technology enterprises.

## Department of Defense (DOD)

\$707,242,586

The Department of Defense (DOD) awarded \$707 million in grants to California in FFY20 through its military branches and subagencies, over \$24 million (4%) more than the \$682 million in FFY19. COVID-19 funding allocated \$52 million in DOD funding to the state.

Funded programs include National Guard Military Operations and Maintenance Projects (CFDA 12.401) as well as research and development for military medical, scientific, technology, and other areas of interest to the DOD. The California Military Department (Cal Guard) was the largest recipient of DOD funding in the state at \$184 million. Other recipients include other state agencies, school districts, institutes of higher education, and science and technology enterprises.

## Department of Energy (DOE)

\$504,967,361

The Department of Energy (DOE) awarded \$505 million in grants to California in FFY20 through eleven of its program offices, a slight decrease from the FFY19 total of \$507 million. None of the DOE funding to the state was from COVID-19 legislation.

The largest funded program (\$287 million) was for the Office of Science Financial Assistance (CFDA 81.049) to support multidisciplinary research in Advanced and Sustainable Energy, Artificial Intelligence and Machine Learning, and other areas. The largest recipient of DOE grant funding was the company General Atomics, followed by institutes of higher education, other science and technology enterprises, state agencies, and other entities.

## Environmental Protection Agency (EPA)

\$467,226,775

The Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) awarded over \$460 million in grants to California in FFY20 through twelve subagencies. EPA funding to the state increased \$125 million (37%) from the previous fiscal year, with no funding in response to COVID-19.

EPA’s Office of Water awarded over \$300 million in grants that supported State Revolving Funds for Drinking Water and Clean Water, among other programs. The largest recipient of EPA funding was the California Water Resources Control Board with over \$280 million funding to support water projects across the state. EPA funding also supported programs addressing air quality, hazardous waste and brownfields, research and development, workforce development, wetlands, beach monitoring, and other programs.

## Department of Justice (DOJ)

\$452,806,031

The Department of Justice (DOJ) awarded over \$450 million to California in FFY20 through eight of its subagencies. DOJ funding to the state decreased \$53 million (10%) from the previous fiscal year, although over \$93 million in COVID-19 funding was awarded in FFY20.

The Office of Justice Programs includes six of these subagencies: Bureau of Justice Assistance (BJA), Bureau of Justice Statistics (BJS), National Institute of Justice (NIJ), Office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention (OJJDP), Office for Victims of Crime (OVC), and Office of Sex Offender Sentencing, Monitoring, Apprehending, Registering, and Tracking (SMART). The largest grant program at \$187 million was Crime Victim Assistance (CFDA 16.575), a formula grant for the financial support of services to crime victims. The California Office of Emergency Services (Cal OES) was the largest recipient of DOJ funding with over \$200 million, followed by the Board of State and Community Corrections

(BSCC) with over \$80 million. Other recipients include county and local governments, tribes, non-profits, institutes, businesses, and other entities.

## Department of the Interior (DOI)

\$363,390,846

The Department of the Interior (DOI) awarded \$363 million in grant funding to California in FFY20 through nine subagencies. DOI funding was approximately the same as the previous fiscal year with no additional funding from COVID-19.

The subagency U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (USFWS) awarded the most funding with over \$130 million, which funded programs for endangered species conservation, wildlife and sport fish restoration, and other environmental conservation programs. The Bureau of Reclamation (BOR) awarded over \$120 million for water reclamation, management, and conservation programs. The largest recipient of funding in the state was the Department of Fish and Wildlife with over \$100 million in funding. Other DOI grantees included additional state agencies, tribes, cities, water districts, universities and others.

## Department of Veterans Affairs (VA)

\$334,804,482

The Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) awarded approximately \$335 million in grants to California in FFY20, more than double the previous fiscal year's total of nearly \$147 million. COVID-19 funding accounted for almost \$118 million in VA funding to the state.

VA funding was awarded through two subagencies, the Veterans Health Administration and the Veterans Benefits Administration. The largest VA grant program was the VA Supportive Services for Veterans Families Program (CFDA 64.033) at approximately \$200 million. VA funding also supported the Homeless Provider's Grant and Per Diem Program, Veterans State Nursing Home, and other health and housing programs. The California Department of Veterans Affairs (CalVet) was the largest recipient of VA funding with approximately \$34 million, followed by the Vietnam Veterans of California and other nonprofits and other entities.

## Department of Commerce (DOC)

\$193,734,609

The Department of Commerce (DOC) awarded over \$190 million in grants to California in FFY20 through six subagencies. DOC funding increased \$52 million (37%) from the previous fiscal year with \$11 million from COVID-19 funding.

The Economic Development Administration (EDA) awarded over \$90 million, most of which (approximately \$85 million) supported Economic Adjustment Assistance (CFDA 11.307). The National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA), also part of DOC, awarded approximately \$76 million for multiple environmental research and management programs. DOC funding supported institutes of higher education, enterprises, state agencies, tribes, counties, and cities in California.

## National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA)

\$184,019,176

The National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA) awarded over \$184 million in federal grants to California in FFY20 through its Directorates, Offices, and Center. NASA funding to the state declined about \$6 million (3%) from the year before with no additional COVID-19 funding.

NASA’s Science Mission Directorate awarded approximately \$135 million to support scientific research and technology. NASA’s Space Technology and Aeronautics Research Mission Directorates each awarded approximately \$21 million. NASA awarded grants to universities and other institutes, organizations, businesses, and other entities.

## Election Assistance Commission (EAC)

\$75,428,977

The Election Assistance Commission (EAC) awarded over \$75 million to California in FFY20, which was granted to the California Secretary of State for the 2018 Help America Vote Act (HAVA) Election Security Grants (CFDA 90.404). These funds supported administration, security, and technology for elections for federal office. EAC funding is provided for election years and there was none awarded in FFY19 to the state. COVID-19 funding allocated \$36 million from the EAC to California in FFY20.



## Agency for International Development (USAID)

\$66,823,722

The Agency for International Development (USAID) awarded approximately \$67 million in FFY20, over \$25 million (61%) more than the previous fiscal year. Much of the USAID grant funding to California in FFY20 (\$45 million) was in response to COVID-19.

USAID funding was awarded to institutes, universities, non-profits, and other entities in California. These funds primarily supported the USAID Foreign Assistance for Programs Overseas (CFDA 98.001), which received approximately \$65 million. Other funding was dedicated to the development partnerships with universities.



## Corporation for National & Community Service (CNCS)

\$57,173,732

The Corporation for National & Community Service (CNCS) awarded approximately \$57 million to California in FFY20, about \$9 million (19%) more than the previous year with no additional funding due to COVID-19.

In September 2020, AmeriCorps became the operating name of CNCS. Most (\$44 million) of CNCS funding supported the AmeriCorps program (CFDA 94.006). The largest recipient of CNCS funding was the Executive Office of the State of California with \$28 million in funding to support California Volunteers. CNCS awarded funding to over 60 organizations statewide, including cities, counties, tribes, nonprofits, and other entities for programs supporting civic engagement and volunteerism.



## Small Business Administration (SBA)

\$48,293,062

The Small Business Administration (SBA) awarded approximately \$48 million in grants to California in FFY20, about \$30 million more than the previous fiscal year's funding of \$18 million. COVID-19 funding accounted for \$27 million of the SBA grants to the state.

This funding was awarded through four of SBA's offices, with most funding (\$44 million) granted through the Office of Entrepreneurial Development. The largest program to be funded was the Small Business Development Centers (CFDA 59.037) with over \$36 million, followed by the Women's Business Ownership Assistance and other programs for business support, trade expansion, and technical assistance. The largest recipients of SBA funding were institutes of higher education, including Humboldt State University, Long Beach Community College, and CSU Fullerton. Other recipients included state agencies, nonprofits, and others supporting community and economic development initiatives.

## Executive Office of the President (EOP)

\$31,913,282

The Executive Office of the President (EOP) awarded approximately \$32 million in grants to California in FFY20, about \$2 million less than the previous year and none of which was from COVID-19 legislation.

All of the EOP funding to California was through the Office of the National Drug Control Policy. Awards were made to cities, counties, non-profits, and other entities in the state for the High Intensity Drug Trafficking Areas Program (CFDA 95.001).



## Institute of Museum and Library Services (IMLS)

\$27,252,709

The Institute of Museum and Library Services (IMLS) awarded \$27 million in grants to California in FFY20, almost \$6 million (28%) more than the previous year. IMLS awarded nearly \$5 million in COVID-19 funding to the state.

The Grants to States program (CFDA 45.310) was the largest funded program with \$19 million awarded to the California State Library, \$9 million of which was sub-awarded to other recipients. Other funded programs included the National Leadership Grants, Museums for America, and other programs for museums and libraries. Recipients also included tribes, institutes of higher education, nonprofits, museums, libraries, and institutes across the state.



## National Endowment for the Arts (NEA)

\$15,684,858

The National Endowment for the Arts (NEA) awarded over \$15 million in grants to California in FFY20, more than \$6 million (72%) more than the previous fiscal year, much of which (\$5.7 million) was in COVID-19 funding.

NEA funding in California supported the promotion of the arts and partnership programs. The largest recipient of NEA funding in the state was the California Arts Council, followed by nonprofit organizations, institutes of higher education, local governments, and other entities.



## National Endowment for the Humanities (NEH)

\$12,621,153

The National Endowment for the Humanities (NEH) awarded over \$12 million in grants to California in FFY20 for the promotion of humanities. NEH funding to the state increased \$3 million (34%) from the prior fiscal year, with about \$2.5 million due to COVID-19 funding.

NEH grants supported preservation and access, public programs, teaching and curriculum development, and a variety of other humanities and social sciences research and initiatives. California Humanities was the largest recipient of NEH funding with \$4 million, followed by institutes of higher education, nonprofits, and other entities.



### Social Security Administration (SSA)

\$4,747,540

The Social Security Administration (SSA) awarded over \$4 million in grants to California in FFY20, approximately the same as the year before with no additional funding due to COVID-19. SSA grants funded two programs, Social Security State Grants for Work Incentives Assistance to Disabled Beneficiaries (CFDA 96.009) and Social Security Work Incentives Planning and Assistance Program (CFDA 96.008). The largest recipient of SSA grants was Disability Rights California, a nonprofit organization, with \$3 million.



### Department of the Treasury (TREAS)

\$3,119,592

The Department of the Treasury (TREAS) awarded California \$3 million in grants in FFY20, about 12% more than the \$2.8 awarded in FFY19 with no COVID-19 funding.

TREAS grants were awarded through its subagency the Internal Revenue Service (IRS). Grants funded three programs: Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA) (CFDA 21.009), Low Income Taxpayer Clinics (CFDA 21.008), and Tax Counseling for the Elderly (CFDA 21.006). These grants were awarded to nonprofits, institutes of higher education, counties, and other entities.



### Nuclear Regulatory Commission (NRC)

\$476,190

The Nuclear Regulatory Commission (NRC) awarded nearly a half million dollars in grants to California in FFY20. No NRC funding was from COVID-19 legislation. NRC grant funding supported a Scholarship and Fellowship Program (CFDA 77.008) at the University of Southern California.



### National Archives and Records Administration (NARA)

The National Archives and Records Administration (NARA) awarded over \$200,000 in grants to California in FFY20, which supported the National Historical Publications and Records Grants program (CFDA 89.003). The largest recipient of NARA funding in the state was Stanford University.

# Schools and Local Governments

## Schools


Schools in California received approximately \$4.6 billion in federal revenues in 2019-20 through awards to school districts (\$3.9 billion) and county offices of education (\$671 million). This funding was for the state fiscal year of 2020 (FY20, July 1, 2019 to June 30, 2020), not the federal fiscal year (October 1, 2019 to September 30, 2020).

Federal grants are primarily received from ED and USDA with other grant funding awarded from DOJ, DOL, DOI, NSF, EPA, HHS, and DHS. For both school districts and county offices of education, the largest category of federal funding is “all other federal funding,” which includes the Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA) that replaced the No Child Left Behind Act as well as programs funded through the COVID-19 CARES Act including the Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief Fund (ESSER) Fund and the Coronavirus Relief Fund. The amount of federal revenue per student by school district is listed in Appendix A.

### School Districts

Funding to support California school districts from all sources (federal, state, and local) in FY20 was \$74 billion, similar to the previous year. These funds were allocated to each school district’s General Fund, which is the chief operating fund for a school district. Local Control Funding Formula (LCFF) revenues provide the majority of funding for school districts and are funded through a combination of local property taxes and state funding from the State School Fund and Education Protection Account.

Federal funding provided **\$3.9 billion** to California School Districts in FY20, or five percent of the General Fund revenues, about the same as the year before. Most of the federal funding (\$3.7 billion) was restricted funding, which is restricted by law or regulation and must be accounted for and tracked separately. Unrestricted funding may be used for general purpose.



***County Offices of Education***

County Offices of Education in California were supported with approximately \$4.5 billion in FY20, most of which (85%) came from State and Local sources. Funds were allocated to the County School Service Fund, which serves as the chief operating fund for the County Office similar to each School District's

General Fund. The total revenue to the County School Service Fund was about 1% lower than the prior year.

Federal revenues in FY20 made up about 15% of the County School Service Fund totaling over **\$671 million**, most of which (over \$609 million) were restricted revenues. Federal revenues to County Offices of Education in California declined \$87 million, or 11%, from the year prior. Much of the decline was in pass-through revenue from federal sources, which totaled \$111 million in FY19 and just \$34 million in FY20.

## Local Governments

Federal funding to local governments (called “Intergovernmental Federal Revenues”) totaled over \$19 billion in the state fiscal year FY20 through awards to counties, cities, and special districts. This represents an increase of 25% from the previous fiscal year.



### Counties

In FY20, counties in California received \$14.1 billion in federal revenues, \$2.4 billion more than the \$11.7 billion received in FY19 <sup>11</sup>. Every county received federal revenue in FY20 with the exception of Humboldt County.



***Cities***

Cities, or local jurisdictions, in California received a total of \$2.75 billion in revenues from federal sources in FY20, \$500 million more than the \$2.25 billion in FY19. Of the 482 cities in California, 427 reported federal revenues in FY20.

***Special Districts***

Special districts in California received \$2.2 billion in federal grant funding in FY20, nearly \$1 billion more than the \$1.3 billion received in FY19. These special districts include organizations responsible for transportation, human services, fire protection, air quality, lighting, cemeteries, and other services. The largest use of federal grant revenue to special districts was for transit, which nearly doubled in funding over the past fiscal year.

# State Government

## Federal Grant Expenditures

The vast majority of all federal funding in California is awarded to California State government agencies and departments. The California Department of Finance, on behalf of the California State government, is responsible for collecting federal expenditure information each year from State departments and agencies that received federal dollars in accordance with the Single Audit Act of 1984 (as amended in 1996) and the OMB's Uniform Guidance. This information is provided for the state fiscal year ending on June 30<sup>th</sup>, not the federal fiscal year.

The State government reported federal grant expenditures of \$143.4 billion in FY20, \$48.5 billion (51%) more than the \$94.9 billion in FY19 due primarily to increased spending in response to the COVID-19 pandemic. Of the total awarded to the State, over \$20 billion was passed through to subrecipients. The federal agency providing the largest source of funding was HHS at nearly \$74 billion. The DOL provided another \$44 billion, mostly in unemployment insurance payments which is not reflected in the USA Spending data and which explains the difference between the two data sources.

The largest single federal program expenditure is the HHS Medical Assistance Program (CFDA 93.778) that provides Medicare and Medicaid payments, at \$61.6 billion. The over \$50 billion in unemployment benefits and SNAP is not reflected in the USA Spending federal fiscal year data, which categorize these as Direct Payments, not Grants. ## Federal Grant Applications Submitted

The State Clearinghouse (SCH) serves as the state's Single Point of Contact for the submission of federal assistance applications pursuant to Presidential Executive Order No. 12372 (EO 12372), Intergovernmental Review of Federal Programs. All applications for federal grants subject to EO 12372 are required to be made available to the State for review through submission on the OPR Intergovernmental Review of Federal Programs website (<https://cfda.opr.ca.gov>). All submissions can be viewed online, and notification is provided to registered state and local elected officials for review and comment.

During FFY20<sup>12</sup>, applicants submitted notice of 1,671 applications for federal grants through the OPR Intergovernmental Review of Federal Programs website. More applications were submitted to the Department of Justice (316) than any other agency, followed by the Department of Health and Human Services (279) and the Department of Agriculture (271). Not all federal grants are subject to EO 12372 and so these figures do not reflect all statewide applications for federal assistance.

State agencies and departments<sup>13</sup> applied for 601 federal grants and were awarded 549 in FFY20, based on data reported by each agency/department. The agency or department with the largest number of federal grant applications and awards in FFY20 was the Office of Emergency Services (Cal OES) with a total of 171 applications and 99 awards, most of which were formula grants. Next was the Department of Fish and Wildlife with 110 applications and 105 awards, most of which were competitive project grants. 

## Training Sessions

OPR facilitated four webinars during FFY20 that provided free training on pre- and post-award grants management to hundreds of individuals across the state. The four 90-minute sessions were titled “Federal Grants in 2020: What’s New and What’s Proposed for the Uniform Guidance,” “Grant Writing Under the Uniform Guidance,” “Evaluation and Logic Models,” and “Indirect Costs and Cost Allocation Plans” and were all provided by the grants consultant Kanoco. Slides and recordings of each webinar are available through the OPR Federal Grants Resources page as well as the OPR YouTube page. Attendance for each session ranged from a low of 57 to a high of 163 individuals. The total attendance for all four sessions was 362, with 312 unique individuals attending at least one session and 38 individuals attending multiple sessions. Attendees represented a wide range of jurisdictions and institutions including state, nonprofit, tribal, and others.

**Figure 8: FFY20 Training Sessions Attendees**





## Federal Grants E-List

In February 2020, the Federal Grant Administrator at OPR initiated a Federal Grants E-List newsletter, the “OPR Federal Grants Update,” a weekly email newsletter highlighting new federal grant opportunities along with federal funding news and a schedule of upcoming grants webinars and events. The E-List reaches over 1,000 subscribers from across and outside the state. Based on email domains, subscribers represent federal, state, local, county, regional, and nonprofit organizations as well tribes and higher education. Email domains identified as “individuals” include those from Gmail and other email service providers, private businesses, and custom email domains.


Figure 9: OPR Federal Grants E-List Subscribers
